Weobley High School Excavates History: Involvement in the Big Dig 2023



In a remarkable display of community engagement and educational enrichment, Weobley High School has made its mark on history by participating in the prestigious Weobley Big Dig 2023 excavation project. canteen for students to read during their lunch break. Stories with links to specific curriculum subjects are on display alongside inspirational, thought-provoking and, occasionally, amusing articles.




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Read Around The World



Criminology workshop

Nicola Taylor, who is the criminology teacher at Hereford Sixth form, attend Weobley High School to give a work shop to our new Year 11 students.

The work shop was 2 hours long and it gave an insight in to what will be involved in the course whilst also having a hands-on approach. Each student was given a work book and at intervals they would work through a task, one of these being where the students had to look at a picture for 10 seconds and then answer questions in the booklet about the picture. Other tasks were taking their own finger prints and looking at each other's to see how they are all different and putting insects in the order that they assist

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in the decomposition of a corpse. They also had the opportunity to look at pictures of blood splatter and how they may have been made, plus many more.

This was a great insight for those students wanting to take criminology at college, yet it was also really insightful and enjoyable for those who don't as this subject is one that many are interested in. The feedback from the students was good with many wanting to do more workshops.



Art Exhibition 2023


